A very warm welcome to our new Year 7 intake! We are very much looking forward to meeting you all this September. These are strange times indeed and of course, under normal circumstance I would be delivering this welcome personally as part of the Year 6 Information Evening. Disappointingly, this has not proved possible this year so instead - a short message of welcome from all at Hellesdon High.

The move to high school can seem a rather daunting prospect, especially for parents who might be thinking about how their child will cope in such a large school with a population in the region of 1500 students.
