Wensum Trust schools are celebrating exceptional GCSE results, with record-breaking achievements and inspiring personal stories across the board.

There were great reasons to celebrate across our trust as schools revealed their GCSE results.

Alderman Peel celebrated the best results the school has ever recorded, and Headteacher Matt Hardman said the entire school community was proud of the achievements of everyone involved.

"They are the best results that the school has ever achieved and put us in the top flight of results for English and Maths across the County," he said. "I am so grateful for the hard work from all staff across the school and the support we have had from parents throughout their time with us." He added: "Within the results, there are some outstanding individual performances with students achieving grades 7 to 9, those all important 4s and 5s, but also students who have worked really hard to achieve grades 1, 2 and 3. We are delighted to achieve all of those results equally. We wish all of our students the very best for their next steps."

The school was also featured on Anglia News as a team from the TV station joined students and staff for the morning.

Staff and students at Acle Academy were also celebrating after another year of strong academic results.

Executive Principal Helen Watts said: "We are delighted with the overall and personal results for our 2025 cohort who have shown great determination and aspiration to achieve their personal best in their GCSEs."

Morgan Seddon, who achieved seven grade 9s a distinction and a grade 8, said: "I am so happy with my results, I can't believe it!"

Mrs Watts said everyone was delighted with the personal achievements of the students, particularly those with Special Educational Needs and/or Disability (SEND). "They have

achieved fantastic results including many grades 9s and 8s.

Tommy Bray, who has an EHCP (Education, Health and Care Plan) achieved an amazing set of results, including two grade 9s and 4 grade 8s. Reacting to his results, Tommy said: "I'm so thrilled and I just want to keep on studying now" Mrs Bray, Tommy's Mum, added: "When Tommy started in Year 7, we didn't think he would survive in mainstream. He couldn't stay in a classroom in primary school, so we are so absolutely delighted that he has made it this far and achieved such wonderful results. We are so grateful to the amazing team at Acle that has supported him so well."

Mrs Watts continued: "It is testament to our inclusive culture that children with additional needs achieve so well at Acle Academy. "I am particularly grateful to our wonderful staff who make our school community such a supportive and caring environment which helps our students to thrive. "Our staff see the potential in every child and work relentlessly to help children achieve amazing success which builds strong foundations for their future." Well done to all students, staff and families who are celebrating the culmination of their hard work today."

Mike Earl, Principal at Hellesdon High School, praised his Year 11 cohort for its hard work and dedication in achieving a strong set of results. "They have worked incredibly hard throughout the year and truly deserve the results they've achieved," he said. APHS returns to the GreenPower Finals

APHS qualifies for national final of student engineering competition! Alderman Peel High School has secured a spot in the Greenpower electric car competition, a national contest where students design, build and race electric kit cars.

The team qualified for the finals during the Norfolk heat on September 21 at the Lotus test track in Hethel, where more than 20 teams competed.

Their success was supported by the JP Blanch legacy fund, which provided funding for one of the cars.

Archie, a student from the team, said: "One of the key things I put in my application [for work experience at Lotus] was my work building the Greenpower car." "I've grown in confidence, learned how to lead a team, and improved my communication and organisation massively."

The JP Blanch fund was established from the sale of a vintage car collection belonging to the late JP Blanch, who died in 2008. The fund, managed by the Norfolk Community Foundation, supports young people in developing engineering and technical skills.

Paul Birch, an engineer and panel member of the JP Blanch fund, said: "It's brilliant to see young people getting hands-on with engineering, applying it in a fast-paced, real-world challenge." "The creativity, problem-solving and teamwork these races inspire are exactly the skills they'll need to take into the workplace."

Barnabas Shelbourne, chief executive of Greenpower, said: "We are extremely grateful for the support from the JP Blanch fund which has enabled schools to compete at a higher level and give more young people the opportunity to explore careers in engineering."

JP Blanch's passion for cars and craftsmanship is living on through every student who takes part in these races. "The national finals will be held at Goodwood in October 2025."

Alderman Peel High School has received an additional grant from the JP Blanch fund to help them prepare.



Ypres Trip

Hellesdon High School's Humanities Department took 44 GCSE History Students on a two day visit to Ypres in Belgium on 23rd and 24th October.

Students learnt about the Medical treatment of soldiers on the Western Front to support their GCSE History course. A highlight of the visit was the ceremony at the Menin Gate. Three of our students were able to be part of the procession in the ceremony and lay a wreath. This was particularly poignant as both Mr Tkaczuk and one of the students have the names of their ancestors on the memorial and one student is related to the longest surviving Irish veteran from World War One. We found the Memorial Museum Passchendaele 1917 very interesting and our students had the opportunity to re-enact the work of stretcher bearers and dress up as a World War I soldier. Throughout the trip the History staff were impressed with the students' attitude and exemplary behaviour. They were respectful and they made the most of the visit - whether it be exploring the battlefields or the chocolate shops.

This award is all about them, and making sure they have the support and resources they need to carry on caring for loved ones whilst prioritising their own wellbeing. I think our pledge that was written with our young carers explains perfectly: "Being positive about being a Young Carer means looking for the magic in the everyday but knowing it's ok not to not always feel sparkly. we love and taking the time we need to take care of ourselves and each other."

The Carer Friendly Tick Award was introduced in 2019 by the Norfolk Young Carers Forum and has expanded via the Caring Together Charity to include a variety of organisations from education to healthcare services.

We are also able to receive expert guidance from Caring Together as it provides tailored resources and training to help everyone involved.
