Key topics covered

During the first term, students will be introduced to a range of new ideas, media and techniques accompanied by a strong emphasis on experimentation and research from primary and contextual sources.

Students will be given the opportunity to develop their own ideas through a more in-depth project based around a chosen theme.

Students will then begin an extended project which involves the analysis of, and responding to, the work of a chosen artist, movement, issue or theme. As well as producing a body of their own work, students will also produce a 'Personal Study' (a 3,000-word essay) in which they analyse the visual qualities and concepts behind the work of other artists as well as making links to their own practical work.

An Externally Set Assignment which allows students to use the skills acquired in Component 1 to develop their own ideas based on a given starting point. This intensive project culminates in students producing an ambitious final piece under controlled conditions during a 15hr exam. This two-year course culminates in a final exhibition and private view evening.
