

# Film Studies

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## Key topics covered

### **Component 1: Varieties of Film and Filmmaking (35%):**

Hollywood 1930-90, American Film since 2005, British Film since 1995.

### **Component 2: Global Filmmaking Perspectives (35%):**

Global Film, Documentary Film, Silent Cinema, Experimental Film (1960-2000).

### **Component 3: Production (Non-Exam Assessment – 30%)**

A short film or screenplay from a short film, plus a digitally photographed storyboard.

**Study Areas:** Elements of Film Form, Meanings and Response, Contexts Auteur, Spectatorship, Ideology, Narrative, Critical Debates, Filmmakers' Theories
