Why Study the Subject/what students Like about it

Sociology is the study of society and of people and their behaviour and in particular is concerned with humans in groups rather than the individual. Over the last couple of centuries sociologists have studied a vast and diverse range of topics including sexuality, popular music, the body, ethnic conflict, poverty, sport, science, health, the law, drug use, war, religion, death, colonialism, housework, mobile phones, youth subcultures, humour and many more..

Opportunities outside the classroom

Students have the opportunity to engage in a primary research project of their choosing to support their own understanding of Sociologists work. This gives students the opportunity to engage in a wider knowledge base beyond the exam specification.

In Y13 students are given the opportunity to visit the Norwich Combined Court Centre to observe the criminal justice system and apply their learning to real world settings.

The Social Sciences Department has strong links with the UEA and students have the opportunity to engage with professionals, alumni and current students in exploring the subject and its future pathways.
