We all enjoyed a fabulous day on our second Service Area Day this last week. Students across all year groups engaged with all events with enthusiasm and were a credit to the school.

Community

Students who participated in the Community Service area did a fantastic job enhancing the school and local environment. Students learned to care for the environment through litter picking in the local area footpaths and fields as well as around the site. Mr Newstead led a group of students who cleaned ivy off the mobiles and painted areas around the school. Mrs Chapman led a group who transformed the bike storage area to a gleaming renewed state. Mrs Mackie and Mrs Perkins led a group of students who designed, painted and installed tyre planters in our garden area. We are very proud of how well students engaged with the activities and took pride in enhancing the school environment.

























Study Support

Year 10 and 11 spent their time with the Study Support Service Area.

We offered a range of activities including revising English literature by creating rap lyrics, how to look after your wellbeing and how to cope with exam stress. Year 10 were introduced to the world of psychometric tests used by lots of the big graduate companies. They worked on a series of number reasoning, linguistic reasoning, abstract thinking and logic problems that they may encounter in interviews. These sessions were run by some of our senior prefects. Year 11 were supported with their upcoming mock exams by looking at common 'silly' 1 mark mistakes in maths exams. We looked at maths revision materials, made revision formulae flash cards and took a look at the adapted formula sheets for this year.



Diversity, Inclusion, Campaigns and Equality


Year 10 enjoyed a day following the Diversity, Inclusion, Campaigns and Equality (D.I.C.E.) activities for our Service Area drop down day.

The activities started with a talk from Norfolk County Council entitled Sexual Harassment Bystander Intervention. The aim was to raise awareness about safety for young women in society. Important messages about sexual violence were given out to students via a Theatre in Education performance. Students benefited from their portrayal of these issues and their exploration of how to deal with these situations. A short workshop followed, exploring how young people may safely respond in these instances, relating it to statistics in schools in the UK.

Their next workshop surrounded gender diversity, delivered by the Growing Roots Community. Students were talked through the various different terminologies used in the context of exploring gender by visitors Andrew Copeman and Charles Caine. Students were able to connect these terms to the wider world around them. The leaders of the workshop gave a real insight into real world issues and views surrounding gender, aiming to teach students about behaviour. They also explored the history of gender identity around the world. The session included an open and honest discussion, where students asked the presenters questions; a process that was hugely valuable!

The third workshop was provided by SEMSA and taught self-defence from a community perspective. Students were given information as to the legal ramifications of applying self-defence techniques and took part in a discussion about the different vocabulary within this context. Later in the workshop, there was an opportunity for students to learn and practice basic practical self-defence techniques within this controlled environment, being made aware that these techniques have an appropriate time and place. Students left the workshop with knowledge of 3 key aspects of self-defence; awareness, boundary setting and combat.







Charity

Charity Service Area- Drop down day



Working together in partnership

We have embarked on an exciting project as the Charity Service Area with the core aim being to build up a working long-term relationship with two charities that we feel are an integral part of our local community.

We will be primarily working with Nelson's Journey and Pets as Therapy.

We know how valuable the services that Nelson's Journey provide for bereaved children in Norfolk are. Equally, we are aware of the amazing services that Pets as Therapy provide for those suffering from mental health problems and how beneficial the love and support of animals can be. Mental wellbeing and support of reflective behaviours is also one of our Academy's main focus points. We can very much see the benefit of the service provided by both charities in support of young people.

Pets as Therapy visited the school to speak with Year 8 and 9 pupils on Thursday 17th March and we organised a series of different classroom-based activities associated with them. We also welcomed several therapy dogs to the school for this visit and the pupils had the opportunity to spend some time with them. Unfortunately, Nelson's Journey couldn't attend on the day due to staff illness but Mr Sayce was sent their presentation and was able to deliver this session. It focused on making pupils aware of the work Nelson's Journey does to support children in Norfolk.

What follows below is a brief snapshot of the day for Year 10 and 11 pupils.

Hospitality and Catering led sessions-

Mr Kennedy and his team of Year 9 students led a dedicated team who worked tirelessly throughout the morning. They made a variety of exceedingly tasty brownies and cookies which were sold at break and lunchtime. The cooking group worked diligently and sensibly to produce treats of the highest quality and judging from the sell-out performance, this was a great success for an excellent cause and they raised over £123.





Persuasive language sessions-

Mr Lengthorn and Mrs Barber led separate sessions on teaching pupils about how charities use persuasive language to encourage people to support their cause. Sessions went through specific examples of posters and campaigns for both Nelson's Journey and Pets as Therapy. The core aim here was for pupils to see the various techniques deployed and to make pupils fully aware of the work of both charities. Importantly, the sessions looked at how students could help write a poster campaign in support of our chosen charities and linked this closely with the work in the art session.

Mrs Evans and Miss Cunliffe led a creative session on creating memory flowers. The purpose of this session linked with our work with Nelson's Journey. We have already created a large memory tree which was very kindly and skilfully created by Mr Green and Miss Maxted and will now go on display near the hall. In the art sessions, pupils were taught how to make these creative craft flowers and the aim was for them to design these with special messages focusing on people who have inspired them or who they appreciate or value. Pupils were fantastically creative in designing their flowers and thoughtful in their messages.

Pets as Therapy Teaching Session

Izzy, Megan and Beth spent the day leading a series of teaching sessions for pupils on the work of Pets As Therapy and the importance of pet therapy in improving wellbeing. All three demonstrated excellent leadership and will make fine teachers!

We were also greeted by a couple of gorgeous greyhounds, a golden retriever and four lovely ladies from the incredible charity, Pets as Therapy (PAT). The charity takes different dogs around to hospitals, schools and care homes. Stroking dogs is known to be a way of relieving stress or anxiety. The two ladies spoke to the students about the work the charity does and how they could get involved as a volunteer. They shared very touching stories as well as showing pictures of the work they do with the dogs in action. The students were lucky enough to say hello to the dogs and had a little cuddle if they wished to. This proved to be extremely popular and many students adored the dogs.

We plan on holding a further non-uniform day for both charities in the not-so-distant future. We will also organise and hold other fundraising activities to raise funds for these charities but also raise awareness of the great work they do.

We are very grateful for the time given up by our chosen charities to come in and support our pupils. Enrichment

The enrichment service area focussed on improving teamwork and communication skills through physical activity. The enrichment sessions were designed to test students' leadership, problem solving and interpersonal skills through fun and exciting opportunities which are not a normal part of the curriculum. Students enjoyed a multisport trip to East Norfolk College, a Laser/Airsoft session and a virtual reality bomb disposal task. Students agreed that the activities were not only fun but productive too with lots of chances to play different roles and overcome challenges together.

The exceptional ball handing work from Ed H and Tom M meant that the team were able to assert their dominance onto the match early on scoring a try.

Tries from Tom M, Seb S and Cullen B following some great team play effectively killed off the match. A late rally from Springwood saw them run in a try towards the end of the game to make things a little closer than they should have been. All in all it was a fantastic team performance and a well-deserved victory for the boys who moved on to the final. They will face either Framingham Earl or Northgate to be crowned County Champions in a game that we are hoping will be able to be played at North Walsham Rugby Club one evening after school, in order for parents and students to come along and hopefully cheer the boys on to victory.

Year 11 Mock Exams

Year 11 are now completing their mock exams until Easter and should be regularly revising at home. We have a wealth of revision material on our school website and students have been given lots of links to useful websites and resources. All students have a login for GCSE pod and we are currently placed 6th in the national leader board so this is a great way to revise.

The best type of revision is something active such as; making revision cards, testing themselves, answering past papers/questions or teaching someone else key information. Research proves that the best way of retaining information is to teach someone else so parents and carers can help your child revise by asking them to teach you content from a topic in a subject. We are now very confident that terminal GCSE examinations will be going ahead so it is really important that students start to seize every opportunity to prepare and revise.

Video games and derogatory language

As parents we all work hard to ensure that our children speak respectfully but sometimes when teenagers get together they use language that they wouldn't dare to use at home. We have seen a rise in comments and language that we find disrespectful in our school community from a small group of students. We are aware that some students are using words and phrases that they don't really understand the meaning of. Some of the language we have picked up has been derogatory to women and we have identified a common thread between social media and video games such as Grand Theft Auto. This particular game has an age rating of 18 and is therefore not suitable for any of our students. We are teaching students to 'call out' when they hear expressions or phrases that are misogynistic or derogatory. We would be very grateful if parents could help support this message at home.

We also use the parent instant messaging system to share important messages from school. Parent help guides are available on our school website. No Pen Day- Wednesday 16th March

As part of our focus on developing oracy skills, we held a No Pen day on Wednesday. Speaking and understanding skills are fundamental for everything we do – learning, reading and writing, managing emotions, developing friendships and entering employment. However, speaking and understanding skills are underrepresented in the national curriculum in comparison to reading and writing. In order to build our students' confidence with speaking skills, lesson activities were designed to maximise oracy. Although some students found it challenging initially, by the end of the day, many had gained confidence and thoroughly enjoyed the different approach to their lesson activities. This is an area we will continue to focus on throughout the year.


