This template can be used for multiple purposes:

- It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium
- It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium
- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make **additional and sustainable improvements** to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated [Primary PE and sport premium guidance](#).

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not



necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

Both included an inspirational assembly and then a workshop for every class. Visit to Wembley Stadium to watch the Lionesses v Netherlands. 14 children and 3 staff. • Teacher CPD & use of specialists to upskill teaching staff. • Investment in more outdoor resources and young sports leader training. • Holkham Woods Week • 10 x KS 1 bikes purchased • Both athlete visits have left lasting memories for our pupils and staff alike, Both had very inspirational stories to tell which were very relatable for lots 		

of our pupils. The trip to Wembley was a phenomenal occasion, many children had not been to London before nor seen a live game of any kind of sport. 14 pupils accessed the trip, 4 of which were PP children. We have seen an improvement in behavior and attainment since the project began 2 years ago.

- CPD in Early Years PE, Learn to Ride cycling, Street Dance, Cricket and Touch Rugby. Increase in staff confidence, better lesson quality and an increase in the number of extra curricular activities.
- New 12 x 6 goals, adjustable basketball hoops and playground equipment to continue our success in providing active playtimes. All year 5 play leaders have undertaken play leader/young sports leader training.
- All year groups attended a day on Holkham Estate, activities included high ropes, nature walks, wild play, camp craft and camp cooking. year 6 pupils camped overnight.
- 2 x learn to ride clubs have run.
 - We will be continuing the Be Inspired project next year.
- CPD will continue to be prioritised
- Equipment will continue to be identified to ensure positive, active playtimes continue. Y5&Y6 will attend sprots leader training in Norwich in Jan 2025.

- 5 tents have been purchased with a view of continuing the Y6 overnight camp offsite each year along with overnight camps for other year groups on the school grounds.
- Learn to ride and confidence builder sessions will continue in 24/25. This adds to our BMX provision that already exists for KS2 pupils.
